In addition, Debra works with many local Realtors creating estate portraits which are used in mailings and advertisements throughout Montgomery County.

Debra Grayer Halprin's works have been featured in articles in Washington Home & Design Magazine, The Washington Post, Palette Magazine, The Gazette Newspaper and Montgomery County Insight Magazine.

#### **Artist Statement**

Although art can serve many purposes, I believe art at its best is an expression of the beauty and wonder of the creation of God. Also as an expression of the inner thoughts and feelings of the artist, a work of art can serve as a window to the soul. The greater the spiritual development and progress of the soul – the greater will be the fruit of the artistic endeavor.

When I am at work with my art I enter into a symbiotic relationship with my subject and the process can become a spiritual experience unlike any other. "Art for art's sake" is the common expression. It is a wonderful bounty that art also serves as a means of communication between the artist, the art and the viewer. Because of this relationship, art can become a means for the uplifting of souls and the elevation of humanity by portraying the dignity and nobility of humankind.

With pastels, oils and colored pencils, I often explore "up close and personal " views of my subjects which tend to be objects of nature such as blossoms and shells. I enjoy portraiture and painting people in their own environment which can often tell a story. I am interested in trying to reveal something of the essence of my subjects through body gesture, facial expression, clothing composition and color. I work with both live models and photographs.

#### Bio

A native of Montgomery County, MD, Dale received her BFA degree from the Maryland Institute College of Art in Baltimore in painting. She then served as an illustrator/ graphic designer/coordinator for NASA for 18 years. Following the birth of her son, she became a freelance artist and later opened her business, Dale's Design/Mill Creek Studio. Dale has taught group art classes at a variety of locations for the past 30+ years. She also offers private and small group lessons in her home studio. She was a Founding Resident Artist at the Gaithersburg Arts Barn (2.5 yrs.) and a temporary resident artist at VisArts (RAP) in Rockville.

Dale works and teaches in drawing, oils, pastels, colored pencils and pen & ink. She is currently a member of the Art League of Germantown, the National Museum of Women in the Arts, certified member of the Maryland Portrait Society and recent past member of the Artist's on Market Gallery. Dale has received a variety of awards locally for her work throughout the years. Currently she is working with portraits and people, some landscapes and close-up, enlarged views of natural objects, such as flowers and shells. Her work can be viewed at the ALOG web site and in her studio.








#### **GAIA**

#### Invention

Maybe invention would be a good theme for an art show! But it is a very good theme for one's life. I would say

that artists have a 'leg up' on most people for pulling off good inventions in so many ways!

When we create our art, invention is a regular part of it. What does invention mean?

creative power or ability

- to produce (something, such as a useful device or process) for the first time through the use of the imagination or of ingenious thinking and experiment
- 2. to devise by thinking: FABRICATE
- 3. archaic: FIND, DISCOVER

If you look over these definitions, you will see that you probably do this a lot more than you realize. What it brings to your life lifts you out of automaticity into a truly creative existence and that is what I have always sought to do.

I find it of interest to look at the origin of words. Often it helps me remember what the definition is! For the word invent, here it is: Latin inventus, past participle of invenire "to come upon; devise, discover."

As you read this, just consider how it applies to you and your life. I know that as I have gotten older, I feel that it is even more important to be coming up with things/activities/ creations and inventions that give pleasure and interest to myself and to others. For some, the older we get, the more we can get bogged down in the same old routines, rarely doing anything new.

So why bother doing this, my friends? BECAUSE IT PAYS OFF IN THE QUALITY OF YOUR LIFE AND IN THE LIVES OF OTHER BECAUSE YOU DO THIS.

Here are some ideas for you but see if you can invent your own list!

- Talk to a stranger in person (a phone call to a business doesn't count)
- Sing an old song you know all the words to
- Go somewhere you haven't been before, or in a long time
- Write a short story or poem and send it to someone
- Handwrite a letter to a friend. Put something in it that you have created
- Buy some new design postage stamps and put it on that letter
- If you have any aftershave or perfume, put it on

- Set up a family Zoom meeting
- Rearrange one of your rooms
- Think up a series for your artwork and do it
- Buy something to eat that you haven't yet tried
- Find something you are thankful for that someone did for you and call them to say so

## Formatting Guidelines for Submitting Photographs

Photographs of our artwork and events are an important way to publicize our craft and art league. Here is the format for submitting images for our newsletter, website Gallery page, Facebook, etc.

Each image should be 180 dpi or greater and 4" or larger on the longest dimension of the image



From the Drawing Board

We are now in November and exciting opportunities are all around us. I recently went downtown with fellow artists to visit the National Gallery to see the "Sargent

and Spain" exhibit which is on display until January 2, 2023.

John Singer Sargent was born in Italy to cosmopolitan American parents. He lived and traveled throughout Europe and America his entire life. As the premiere portrait artist of his era, he was exposed to the highest of society throughout the world.

His travels in Europe included time spent in Spain. While there he enveloped himself in the local culture, history, and architecture. This exhibit is a wonderful cross section of his art experience of that time. It is full of scrapbook memorabilia, detailed graphite sketches, oil sketches, and studies for several of his works and other interests. He admired Velazquez and Goya and copied many of their paintings to further understand their process and thinking. His graphite sketches and workups to composing his paintings are fascinating to see and give you a further understanding to Sargent's final decision making in completing the work(s).

In addition, the exhibit has a large selection of architectural, harbor, and still life watercolor studies.

This exhibit is a rich insight into how Sargent thought and interpreted his subjects. If you visit, I recommend the accompanying companion book that is available (\$55). It includes all the images from the exhibit, including the rare glimpses of his sketches and reference paintings.

But wait, there's more! In addition to the Sargent exhibit, there is another strong and compelling exhibit on display as well: "Vermeer's Secrets" which is on display until January 8, 2023.

This exhibit, which follow an exhibition of work by Vermeer contemporaries a few years back, is a look into Vermeer's process and handling of color. It is a compelling technical look at his work and how he applied color and paint to the canvas. It also has a wall display of two paintings accepted as Vermeer's but through technology are now labeled forgeries.

I love investigating color, its application, and the painting processes of all the past masters. So, it is no wonder why I was committed to this exhibit. Vermeer painted few works in his lifetime, often spending over a year on a painting. He stood out amongst his peers.

His life and work make him extremely interesting to know more about.

As you can see, these two exhibits are a "must see" and I plan to visit them again before they gone. I highly recommend them to you all, as well as the other fine art our National Gallery has to offer.

As for things I am working on, well I have been going through every single tube of oil paint I own (over 100) and cleaning them up. Many had caps that would not open and were coated with dried paint and concealed oil. I have worked on this bit by bit for some weeks now and am finally coming to the last few. I even bought a box of empty tubes and filled most of them with oil paint from tubes that were past redemption. Some of the caps I soaked in solvent and I used a craft knife to clean the caps and threads of the tubes and felt much like a dental technician removing tartar!

My next task will be to do a thorough examination of my many brushes, palette and painting knives. Getting totally reacquainted with my materials after these last few odd years!
